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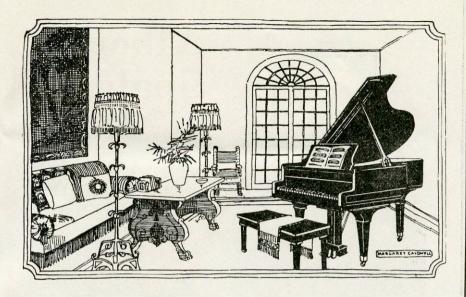

This is one of the reasons for people putting up with the inconveniences connected with city life. namely, that they can enjoy good music from time to time.

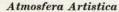

ACT I.—Ballroom in a Chateau. ACT II.—Cafe Hottot in Paris. ACT III.—Revolutionary Tribunal. ACT IV.—Prison of Lazare at Midnight.

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STORY OF THE OPERA

Act I.—Gerard, a servant, but also a revolutionist, is secretly in love with Madeleine, the Countess's daughter. Among the guests at a ball is Andrea Chenier, a poet with revolutionary tendencies. Madeleine asks him to improvise a poem on love. Instead, he sings of the wrongs of the poor. Gerard appears with a crowd of ragged men and women, but at the Countess's command servants force the intruders out. Chenier and Madeleine, the latter weary of the routine of fashion, have been attracted to each other.

Act II.—Several years later in the Cafe Hottot, Paris. Chenier has offended the revolutionists by denouncing Robespierre. A spy is watching Bersi, Madeleine's old nurse, and sees her hand Chenier a letter. It is from Madeleine. She loves him. She is dogged by spies, begs him to come to her aid, and arranges a meeting. Robespierre passes, followed by a mob. Gerard, now high in favor, seeks to possess Madeleine, who comes to meet the poet. They are about to flee, when Gerard, notified by the spy, interposes. Chenier and Gerard fight with swords. Gerard is wounded. The lovers escape.

Act III.—The crowd sings the "Carmagnole." Chenier has been captured. Gerard writes the indictment for his rival. Madeleine pleads for her lover, finally promising to give herself to Gerard if Chenier is spared. Gerard, moved by the girl's love, agrees to save Chenier if he can. At the trial he declares that the indictment against Chenier is false. But the mob, thirsting for more blood, demands the poet's death.

Act IV.—Madeleine enters to Chenier with Gerard. She has bribed the jailer to allow her to substitute for another woman prisoner. If she cannot live for her lover, she can, at least, die with him. Together she and Chenier go to the scaffold.

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SYNOPSIS

Count Di Luna had two sons. The younger was supposed to have been bewitched by a gypsy woman, who was therefor burned alive. Azucena, the latter's daughter, swore vengeance. She succeeded in kidnaping the younger son of the old Count, because of her mother's fate. With him she repaired to the stake at which her mother's ashes were still to be seen. By mistake Azucena threw her own babe into the flames instead of the stolen child. She fled to her tribe, bearing the boy with her. He grew to superb manhood, and was known as Manrico the Troubadour. In the meantime the Count had died. His older son succeeded to the title. The new Count was in love with Duchess Leonora Leonora.

Act I.—Manrico, disguised, has been crowned victor of a tourney by the Duchess Leonora. A love results, shared by both. One night the Count, while in the Royal Gardens, is surprised by the voice of the troubadour. Leonora, attracted by the song, has come from her palace. Mistaking the Count for his unknown brother, she hastens to him. Manrico has seen and is jealous. He and the Count duel. Manrico is not injured. He joins the army and leaves for the wars, is found on the battlefield by Azucena. She removes him to her mountain home and there restores him to health.

Acts II and III.—He learns that Duchess Leonora, believing him dead, is about to enter a convent. He sets out and overtakes Leonora just in time, conducting her to Castellor, which is at once besieged by Di Luna. The troubadour is preparing for his marriage when he suddenly learns that a gypsy (his supposed mother) is to be burned alive, having been taken by the enemy as a spy. Hastening to rescue her he is repulsed and taken prisoner. On the eve before the day set for the execution of mother and son, Leonora suddenly appears before Di Luna, offering her hand in marriage in exchange for the life of Manrico. The Count agrees.

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IL TROVATORE-CONTINUED

Act IV.—Leonora is permitted to enter the prison to release Manrico. On her way, however, she takes poison. Manrico, who doubts Leonora, now sees her faithfulness. Di Luna enters, takes in the situation at a glance, and orders that Manrico be killed. During the execution the Count drags Azucena to the window that she may behold the fate of her son. She then exposes her secret, and cries, "Manrico is thy brother. Mother, thou art avenged."

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
