Mr. MITCHELL. Mr. Prent, I ask unanimous consent to give a notice.

on the 11th of November I induced the bill (S. 276) to provide for the celebration of the hundredth anniversary of the exploration of the Oregon country Capts. Meriwether Lewis and William Clark during their edition from the Mississippi River to the Pacific Ocean in theirs 1804, 1805, and 1806; and to authorize a commission represent the United States to hold at the city of Portland, in the St of Oregon, a national, international, and oriental exhibition cts, industries, manufactures,

and the products of the rivers, soil, mine, forest, and sea in said State; and to provide and assist in the erection of a memorial building in said city of Portland, to be known as the Lewis and Clark Memorial Building; and to authorize an appropriation for

Clark Memorial Building; and to authorize an appropriation for all said purposes.

At my request the bill was ordered to lie on the table. I stated then that I would call it up at some convenient time for the purpose of explaining the bill.

I desire to give notice that on Thursday next, the 17th, immediately after the conclusion of the morning business, I shall ask the unanimous consent of the Senate to call up the bill for the purpose of explaining its provisions.
