I am herewith requesting the City Council to grant me a restaurant license and also to approve waiving the customary 90 day waiting period before an Oregon Liquor Commission restaurant license is granted. It is my desire to begin immediate operation of a restaurant with bar service available at premises known as the Club Savoy, 1500 N. Williams Avenue, Portland, as soon as possible. If I should be required to comply with the 90 day waiting period, the goodwill of this business and the limited capital I have to conduct operations would be thoroughly dissipated.

This request, while perhaps somewhat irregular, is of immense significance. At the present, a restaurant of this type, where Negro people are welcome, is non-existent in this city. It is within reason to expect that such accommodations should exist. At this writing there are approximately 10,000 adult citizens in this area who are denied this form of social participation because of factors that need not be emphasized at this time.

This problem, where Negroes are concerned, has been seriously aggravated. As a result of the floods of 1948, the population of the Negro people in this immediate vicinity has more than doubled its pre-flood status. Evening entertainment and relaxation such as I propose to offer has been withheld from this group of citizens much too long.

In the conduct of this business Negroes will be employed regularly as musicians, bar attendants, cooks, waiters and in maintenance. This is of extreme importance to this community. As you know, the avenues for extensive work opportunities for members of this group are not at all plentiful.

Prior to Jan. 1, 1949 these premises had been in almost continuous operation since 1944. Its service to its patrons was keenly felt. The building is fully furnished and equipped. The kitchen and restaurant has always merited a Class A rating. All fire, plumbing and other requirements are fully complied with.
