## JOINT PTA HEARS YOUTH PROGRAM NEEDS

On Thursday evening March 14th Vanport's three PTA groups held their first
joint meeting in order to consider the
problems of a summer program for Vanport
youth and to hear a report by Mr. James
T. Hamilton, Superintendent of Vanport
City Schools, on the current status of
next year's school budget appropriation.

Representatives of the Roy Scouts, Girl Scouts, Y. M. C. L., Y. W. C. L., Campfire Girls, United Church Ministry, and Project Services, presented their program plans for the summer and indicated the number of volunteer leaders which would be needed to carry them out.

With Lanham act funds for recreation leaders withdrawn and no summer school program available this summer, the total load of summer activities for Vanport's 6,300 young people under the age of 20 will fall on the agencies listed above. The regular youth agency programs will be able to handle approximately 1,700 youngsters in organized programs one to five hours per week, providing they have the assistance of at least 100 additional volunteer leaders willing to give an average of three hours per week. Project Services will be able to devote a staff of eight persons to the operation of community centers and playgrounds for youth activities. With a minimum of 200 volunteers giving three hours per week this community center and playground program will be able to operate a fulltime program to most the minimum rec reation needs of approximately 1,500 youngsters per day. This means that out of 6,300 youngsters, 1,700 will have organized activities for one to five hours per week, 1,500 will have super vised recreation facilities, and 3,100 will have no recreational or avocational outlets in Vanport this summer.

The need for serious consideration of this problem and for cooperation and assistance from all Vanport residents in meeting it is obvious. All possible (Continued on Page Three)

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volunteer leaders should be referred to Community Building leaders.

Mr. Hamilton's report on the school budget appropriation indicated that it was now in congressional committee and would probably receive favorable action eventually but that rapid passage is necessary if we are to avoid losing a large number of our teachers thru failure to renew contracts promptly. Letters to Senators Guy Cordon and Wayne Horse will give them the support they need to expediate action on this bill.
