HUNGER

"No one saves anything, now that rationing is over. Two weeks in early February showed an increase of 124,155 cubic yards of material picked up by our trucks as compared with the same period in 1945." That is the condition as reported by Commissioner Powell of the New York City Department of Sanitation. The same can be said for any other city in the United States unless you do something about it.

The most casual newspaper reader knows that the world faces a crisis worse than anything in the war, that famines on a scale unknown for centuries are imminent in both Europe and Asia. Let's look at the situation:

FRANCE: The first danger sign was France's reimposition of bread rationing (lifted a few months earlier) on December 27; a few weeks later the De Gaulle Government fell, largely on the food issue; today France is hungrier than ever and the situation is getting worse.

ENGLAND: On February 5, the British Food Minister stunned the Country with an announcement of severe ration cuts.

On March 1, the British cut rations in their Zone of Germany from 1,500 calories a day to 1,040.

ITALY: Italy is even hungrier than Germany: rations now are officially set at 650 calories a day; UNRRA will spend \$375,000,000.00 there this year, but this will at best only keep rations at this famine level.

EAST: In the East, MacArthur has just tripled his original request for American grains to feed the Japanese, while India faces a far worse famine than that in Bengal in 1943, when 1,500,000 persons died. It says in Politics, Vol. 3, #3.

A conference for action to stop the March of Famine will be held on May 22 in Washington. It is being organized and promoted by the Food for Freedom organization, which has taken the lead in this field for a long time. All Organizations, National and Local, are invited to attend.

Whether attendance is possible or not, organizations of all descriptions are invited to signify their agreement with the draft resolution printed below. It will be presented to the President, but the real idea is to impress visiting food officials here for a conference on world food planning sponsored by the United Nations that the American people are willing to shart more than most of them have been led to believe by our official action thus far.

"Because millions face famine now and in the months to come; because food shipped from the United States has not been proportional to the needs or to what we could have provided; because we are convinced that most Americans are prepared to make real sacrifices to end starvation; and because this is necessary for the establishment of peace: WE URGE our government not only to double, where possible, its famine emergency program of immediate shipments, but also to increase production of foods needed for relief and to obtain, by requisition if necessary, for purchase by other governments and UNRRA, a much larger proportion of our abundant food supply than has been made available during the past year, and to provide for consumer rationing to assure fair distribution at home of any foods made scarce by this action, at the same time safeguarding the interests of farmers, workers and employ-(Continued on Page Three)

They go on to advise that the only wiring within apartments should be those extension cords that are permitted by the normal use of the convenience outlet plug furnished for that purpose. The Fire and Safety Division points out that not only are we endangering ourselves and all other residents of the community, but that anyone guilty of improper wiring can be held legally and financially responsible for all fire damage resulting from this practice.
