#### AVAILABLE AT PERMANENTE HOSPITAL

The Permanente Hospital, Vanport City, is very much in need of a reserve of registered nurses and experienced nurses aides, according to Dr. J. W. Neighbor, medical director, and Mrs. Nargaret Blanchard, superintendent of nurses at the hospital.

Since the hospital needs fluctuate, it is impossible to maintain a full-time staff to take care of the hospital when it is extremely rushed. On the other hand, it must not be under-staffed so that it is handicapped when numerous Full and part-time nurcalls come in. ses and nurses' aides for general nursing and "out patient" clinic work are needed therefore for day and evening work so that the Permanente Hospital will be adequately staffed at all times. Vanport women interested in employment may contact Mirs. Margaret Blanchard at the hospital or call her at Tyler 0280.

Open twenty-four hours a day, the Permanente Hospital in Vanport is available not only to those people who have signed on the Permanente prepaid health plan, but to any patient on a fee for service basis just as any other hospital Dr. Neighbor stated, speaking for the hospital staff. Emergency cases will be treated at any time, but, Dr. Neighbor added, appointments should be made for (Cont. on page 4, column 2)

In the latter case they may be enlisted in the grade held at discharge, the same as all other men reenlisting.

routine types of treatment in order to insure prompt service.

Equipped with 12 staff doctors and 30 full-time nurses, the Permanente Hospital has complete out-patient facilities. Services are available here for X-ray, laboratory work, and physio-therapy treatment, and doctors have use of all facilities that have been in the hospital for the past four years. Two ambulances are in constant attendance, and when patients do not have transportation to come to the hospital for treatment, arrangements can be made to take them there where specialists and complete equipment can be used to the fullest extent. The hospital, not the home, is the "doctor's workshop" stated Dr. Neighbor, and there the patient gets the best treatment.

The hospital's medical director said that the courtesy staff—in other words, doctors not on the Permanente staff who have used the facilities of the hospital in the past—is still privileged and welcomed to use the hospital facilities.

The interior of the building has been completely renovated recently by the Housing Authority, including repainting. New fluorescent lights have also been installed in the halls.

couver and Portland to finance this type of a paper. A copy of the VOICE would then be available for every apartment in Vanport each time it is printed, whether that be daily, weekly, bi-weekly, or monthly.

This idea will never materialize unless an efficient, diligent advertising staff is willing to solicit advertising. A printed paper will also need business manager, endless reportersfrom all age groups, circulation staff; ....and lots more. In a city of 22,800, nine reporters only touch the news. Each unit should have a reporter, and that reporter should be deadline conscious. Late news is no news.

A faithful, dependable circulation staff is imperative. The invariable answer, when a volunteer is asked what he or she would like to do on the VOICE. is, "Anything but deliver. That's too much work." What's the use of having a paper for Vanporters if Vanporters don't get a copy to read? "Circulation" at present consists of one energetic junior high school boy and a bicycle. This "staff" delivers the 2,000 mimeographed copies of the VOICE to the Groceterias, Drug Stores, Library, and other public places every other Friday. Outlook for . a complete staff of teen-agers is not very hopeful, so the 6 to 12-year-old Vanporters have been appealed to,
