## FLOMERS FOR FUN By Ruth Stickley:

By buying a few packages of aster and nasturtiun seeds, you can have a lot of fun at a nominal cost. These plants have worderful colors and make sweet bouquet- for lots of blooms, try petunias. These flowers have a profusion of blossoms from mid-junc until the frost.

Dahlias, zinnias and marigolds are all very, very easy to raise, and from them the gardener reaps a rich reward in technicolor.

For an old-fashionad flower bed; just like grandmother used to have, plant blue larkspur, pink sweet william and dainty cosmos.

Another ansiver to that statement might be the fact that only 2,500 copies of the VOICE are being mimeographed each time which is hardly enough to cover the more than 6,000 apartments in Vanport.
