Then Nero finds another corpse at his doorstep. Wolfe plows straight through political intrigue, public pressure, and the police- to come up with the astounding solution.

Heart of Danger by Howard Pease

For boys of junior high and high school age is this tale of adventure on land and sea with Tod Moran, third mate of the tramp steamer "Araby."

The Thresher by Herbert Krause

Like life, "The Thresher" is an intricate combination of day-to-day living, harsh conflict, passion, beauty and love. Mr. Krause makes poetry out of realism without compromising truth. As Wallace Stegner said of him, "The beauty of his style doesn't dilute the honesty of his scenes, yet even in the bitterest of these scenes, his words sing."

In the forefront is Johnny Black, as he comes to call himself, but not far behind him is the whole community of wheat farmers in the Pockerbrush Hills of western Minnesota, with their narrow religion, their lusty dances, beer drinking and barnyard bawdy talk, their constant struggle with the land. It is a hard struggle, crushing many of them and making them old before their time, but it never kills their humor and their joy in a party, whether it is a cradling match, a christening or a barn-dance.

By buying a few packages of aster and nasturtium seeds, you can have a lot of fun at a nominal cost. These plants have wonderful colors and make sweet bouquets. For lots of blooms, try petunias. These flowers have a profusion of blossoms from mid-June until the frost.

Dahlias, zinnias and marigolds are all very, very easy to raise, and from them the gardener reaps a rich reward in technicolor.

For an old-fashioned flower bed, just like grandmother used to have, plant blue larkspur, pink sweet william and dainty cosmos.

The wealth of flowers that will bloom for you with a minimum of effort is not limited to the above groups. Our climate is suited to a long list of annuals and perennials.
