One hundred and seventy-one years ago today a group of our forefathers signed a momentous document -- "THE DECLARATION OF INDEPENDENCE --, setting forth certain in-alienable rights of Americans: Life, Liberty and the pursuit of happiness.

Now, for nearly one and three quarter centuries, the way of American life has been based upon the document; wars have been fought and won to defend its doctrines; a mighty nation was born and flourished; a nation, where, within reason, a man is allowed to choose his own way of life. Racial and religious intolerance is steadily vanishing; we have become the richest nation on earth and are looked to as military and political leaders by the remainder of the world. Here also, as in no other place in the universe, free enterprise is present.

Is it any wonder that on this great day--July 4th, 1947, the 171st anniversary of the birth of our nation we Americans are jubilant? That every Army post and Naval ship or station will fire a 48 gun salute? That fathers and mothers will tell their children the reason for this annual cele-

SUNDAY SIGHTSEEING

Since we have a four day vacation coming up let's plan on a real trip down to Southern Oregon.

We'll leave on Highway 99E through Salem, Albany and on to Eugene. There is a beautiful drive around the University of Oregon campus. On we go to Roseberg the lumber capital of the nation and down to the junction city of Grants Pass on the famous Rogue River. The colorful history famous Rogue River. of this area dates back to the blazing of the historic Applegate trail. Just a few miles further we come to Gold Hill where we will stay the night. There are several lovely Motels situated along the Rogue River, one of which is the Lazy Acres Motel. It is centrally located in relation to all the scenic drives we wish to make. Rates are quite fair for resort prices. Then one can fish or take a side trip to the most unusual attraction -- only 5 miles away -- The famous House of Mystery. It was originally an assay office but the area around it dates back to the day of the Indian. It was known as forbidden ground to them and was never used until the white man came. It wasn't until 1943 that a solution was found for the unusual circumstances. Everything in the circle inclines to the Magnetic Pole. Plumb lines do not hang straight and when a person faces south he is shorter than when facing north. Also the laws of perspective do not conform to what you see there. It is exceptionally interesting.

Another interesting trip is the Oregon Caves, 57 miles away. There you can see Oregon's natural caves. There is a beautiful Chalet there which has a cool stream running through its dining room surrounded by growing wild flowers. A Guide will take you through the deep cool caves and the trip takes a little over an hour. At the entrance you overlook the beautiful blue Siskiyou forests and mountains.

Of course our main trip is to Crater Lake National Park. The mileage is 86 miles for the round trip.

As we go into the park we see snow piled on either side and it is rather cold for July. There are deer and bear to be seen but keep at a distance as a full-sized bear can easily damage a car trying to get sugar or foodstuffs out. The drive along the river is one of Oregon's most beautiful scenes. In fact pictures can not do justice to beautiful Crater Lake. The intensive blue of the water is legendary and volcanic surroundings are interesting to note.

If you like historic places don't miss Jacksonville, scene of the earliest gold strike on the coast and locale for the

famous novel <u>Canyon</u> <u>Passage</u>.

You might like to come home along the coast route, stopping to see the Sea Lion Caves and take in our beautiful coastline which is noted all over the world.
