It would have been just to my hand to have gone to St.Louis in behalf of the Lewis & Clark enterprise. I know Oregon and its people, probably as well, if not better than most Oregonians. I know what is produced, where and how much. The whole country, from the Willamette to the Snake; from the Cal. and Nev.line to British Columbia is familiar to me, and I really, - if I have to say it myself, don't know where a better posted man could be found.

I have been urged to point out this and that defect in the progress of preparation, but have resolutely declined, after turning the carpers down as they deserved. The other letter that you speak of reached me just as I was leaving Portland for here again, which explains why it has not been answered. The matter of your appointment, or your connection in any way with the Lewis & Clark Exposition has had my best attention at all times and I have talked it over time and again with Mr. Reed and Mr. Goode and number of other Directors or our Exposition, and why they could not find a place for you, especially in the department of Publicity and Exploitation, ia a question I am unable to answer. I feel confident, and you know that I know that there is no man better qualified to fill such a position than yourself, and a man that has done as much for the state of Oregon and is thoroughly known in the State of Oregon beyond it's boundaries and must certainly have a place in our Exposition, and I still hope that since the

new organization of the board which had a new lot of members to it's Executive Committee, that they will see their way clear to find a place for you. There is nothing in my department with which you are familiar as it portends practically to Foreign and Demestic Exhibits only.
