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

Quite a number of friends and acquaintances called my attention to the "nice little boost" which Mr. Dosch gave my book, &c &c, but one little story in connection therewith deserves to be told. Meferring to the enclosed newspaper clipping, and more particularly to that part of it which speaks of the necessity of supplying space for an over-flow from the Liberal Arts Building, &c: there is considerable discussion going on here as to the failure of the L & C management to provide suitably for an exhibit of the nature of the one which at St. Louis is housed in the Educational and Social Economy Building. This building, I hear, is one of the unique and new features of the St. Louis Fair, and should not be overlooked at the L & C Exposition, more especially as the West is proud of its interest in matters educational and generally progressive and advanced. Inquiry at headquarters here elicits the information that the L & C educational and social economy exhibit will be housed in the gallery of the Liberal Arts Building. In view of all this, when reading the clipping he rewith, and seeing the suggestion that a new building is likely to be put up for Foreign Exhibits and the present Foreign Exhibits Building used as an annex to the Liberal Arts Building, it occurred to me that it might be feasible and desirable, if these changes are necessary, to re-christen the present "Foreign Exhibits Building" the "Educational and Social Economy Palace", and let it, under that name,

catch the overflow from the Liberal Arts Building. For in the Liberal Arts Building there surely will be many things that could as appropriately be placed in the Educational and Social Economy Building, &c. The idea is that it will look well to have a building devoted to "Education and Social Economy", rather than to have two buildings going by the name of "Liberal Arts". This by way of suggestion merely - I suppose you dont get more than a thousand or two suggestions every day. I feel for you, but - I cant reach you!
